Stephaníe & Jordan Ross March 10, 2018

S ome love stories start slow, others kick off with a bang. The day Stephanie Sechrist and Jordan Ross met, sparks were flying, literally. While at a mutual friend's Fourth of July lake party, Stephanie asked Jordan for a sip of his drink. The two spent the remainder of the evening together as their love story set sail.

Other wedding day preparations incorporated the couple's entire family. Stephanie wanted to use wine bottles in their centerpieces, so the couple asked their Aggie families to save some from their tailgates. "We were probably expecting it to













take four or five months," Jordan says. "By the next football game we announced we had them all," Stephanie adds. "It was fun because then everybody came to the wedding, like, 'Is that my wine bottle?"

While their families enjoyed looking for wine bottles they contributed, Stephanie and Jordan shared excitement in seeing each other as Stephanie came down the aisle.

"She looked gorgeous," Jordan explains. "That's a moment you anticipate and it's a moment that's better than you think it would be. ... I saw her and immediately started tearing up."

On the other end of the aisle, Stephanie was walking hurriedly in her custom Nikes with her dad. "Me and my dad were around the corner when the music started playing and I don't know why, but I felt like we were super late but we weren't," she explains. "I felt kind of rushed coming in the doors, so when we were done laughing about it, because my dad was like, 'Stop freaking out,' I turned and I saw [Jordan] and was like, 'Oh my gosh!' The couple shared a first dance; sang the Aggie War Hymn with their Aggie guests, then followed it with a special dance from Stephanie and her friends on the Aggie Dance Team; had an impromptu limbo line using glow stick necklaces; and incorporated a choreographed dance from Stephanie and her dad.

After dancing the night away, the couple headed out to start their journey as a married couple. They say married life is even better than expected. "Honestly, it just feels really natural," Stephanie shares. "Married life is awesome." *i*



an Aggie Angels dinner party at Napa Flats Wood-Fired Kitchen. After dinner, she was blindfolded by the vice president of the organization and was told there was another surprise for all the girls. "Utter panic came over his face and he just started booking it across the church all the way to this room on the other side for the ring and he literally came back with it out-of-breath, right before he was supposed to walk down," says Tia. "That provided a little comedic relief."













Tia and Joshua were married on Dec. 16, 2017, at A&M United Methodist Church and had their reception at Astin Mansion. Tia says that while she was very stressed throughout the planning process, everything ended up all working out really well.

"I feel like for me the wedding planning time leading up was so stressful, so I had it in my mind that I wasn't really going to enjoy the wedding," says Tia. "I was honestly so surprised by the end of the night, I was like, 'This is like the best day of my life and I can't believe it because everything leading up to this was really, really stressful."" For most couples, it can be hard to find some alone time during the reception when everyone is surrounding them, but Tia and Joshua made a point to do so.

"At the end before people lined up with sparklers, they ushered everyone away to get them ready and then me and Joshua got to have a last dance together on the dance floor, just us two with no one around," Tia says. "It was really special to look back on the whole night and have that moment to reflect on what's happened and what's going to happen and the rest of our lives together. It was just kind of like a deep breath before moving on with the rest of our lives." *i*



"It's a beautiful, floor-length navy gown, very timeless, but not something you'd typically see a bride wearing on her wedding day," says Audra. "I wanted to do something totally different from the typical white gown, since I was planning to save my beautiful, white and cream wedding gown for our honeymoon in Paris, France, where we planned to take our wedding portraits."

Keeping the wedding simple (like hand-making the bouquet to keep costs lower) allowed Jordan and Audra to have their dream honeymoon in Europe.

"We spent two weeks in Europe where we visited Paris, Prague, and Budapest," says Audra. "It was definitely a once in a lifetime trip."

What made the honeymoon even more special was taking their wedding portraits in the early morning light while all the Parisians slept. "It was as if we had Paris all to ourselves."

By this point Becca believed Brett already had the ring, so she was understandably a bit disappointed. Becca also says she thought all her high school friends had come to College Station to see a mutual friend who lived in Montana, so she didn't suspect a thing.

On the morning of the proposal, Brett told Becca they needed to pick up a computer part for a project Becca was working on at Texas A&M's campus.

"I wanted an excuse to get her outside of the Kleberg building because that's where we met," says Brett. "So, we go outside and I stop her and look at her in the eyes and said, 'Do you realize that three years ago from this spot is the first time that I ever walked away from you and ever since that moment I felt like every moment I spent apart from you was a waste of time, and I'm done wasting time.""







IF WALLS COULD TALK Tales of Innovation and Renovation from the Cavitt House

Built in the late 1870s, the Cavitt House is one of the oldest structures in Bryan College Station, according to Randy Haynes, senior city planner for the City of Bryan.

"The house was a style called Italianate," Haynes says. "It was built at about the same time as Texas A&M [opened]. It's one of the few buildings in Brazos County that is as old as the institution of A&M. There's probably no building at A&M as old as this."

William R. Cavitt married Mary Mitchell, a niece of Colonel Harvey Mitchell, commonly called the "Father of Brazos County." Together, they had six children, two of which were twins. W.R. Cavitt built the two-story house with exposed brick, gingerbread trim, and three-inch-thick wood floors on a plot of land as old as the City of Bryan. The land's records date back to when the county courthouse was in Boonville. According to Haynes, W.R. Cavitt owned all the land between his house and Villa Maria Road. The neighborhood surrounding the Cavitt House became known as Jackass Prairie because many of the homeowners were doctors and lawyers, Haynes says.

The exterior walls of the Cavitt House are three layers of brick thick. If they could talk, each brick would have a story of its own about the fascinating people who have passed through the 140-yearold home.

W.R. Cavitt's influence on the community includes roles in the development of Bryan and Texas A&M

University. He was a lawyer; county attorney; rancher; oil leaser; director at Texas A&M, which is the equivalent of a regent today; an early investor in the City National Bank; and a true character. His family came to the Brazos Valley in 1836, the same year the Alamo fell, according to Haynes. "Cavitt was born up in Wheelock," he says. "They were a fairly prominent family. They had some means. They owned some enslaved people."

W.R. Cavitt's interaction and play with slaves as a child likely played an influential role in a civil rights lawsuit that took place in Bryan long before civil rights suits were common, explains Haynes. Born enslaved to the Cavitts in Wheelock, Perry Cavitt likely played with W.R. Cavitt when they were children. As

a young man, while delivering melons in a horse-drawn wagon in Bryan, Perry and his friends stopped in front of the house of a white Bryan homeowner who started lipping and shooting at them, Haynes explains. The African American men fled leaving their horses and wagon behind, and returned armed with a gun. The homeowner started shooting again, but this time Perry shot back and hit the man. The man died from his wound five days later. Surprisingly given the period in history when this took place, Perry was able to stand trial without being lynched; however, at his trial, he was found guilty and sentenced to death. Perry hired an African American lawyer named Johnson, who argued Perry was not tried by a jury of his peers. "It went to the appellate court, and his argument did not prevail, but they commuted Cavitt's sentence from death to life in prison," Havnes says. "So, they sent him to Huntsville in the middle of the 1870s. Then in about 1905 or 1906, there was a new governor in Texas (who W.R. Cavitt apparently had some pull with) that commuted Perry Cavitt's sentence, or pardoned him. He left Huntsville, came to Bryan, and immediately went to W.R. Cavitt's house."


Though W.R. Cavitt cared enough about Perry to save him from life in prison, it is unclear whether or not W.R. Cavitt was a Ku Klux Klan member. In a newspaper article Haynes read from 1913, W.R. Cavitt says he is not part of the Klan. After the last of the Cavitt children died and the house was sold, a trunk of robes was found in the Cavitt House attic with names of prominent community members sewn into them. One of the robes bears the name, "W.R. Cavitt." This particular Klan robe can be seen at the Cushing Library at Texas A&M today.

Without W. R. Cavitt, there would likely not be a Cushing Library, much less Texas A&M. To save money, the Texas













government tried to close Texas A&M and give its funding to The University of Texas three times before World War I, Haynes explains. "Cavitt was one of the men that persuaded Sullivan Ross, after he left the governorship, to come and be the president of A&M," Haynes says. A letter on governor stationary from Sul Ross to W.R. Cavitt says, "I've decided to accept the presidency of Texas A&M." Once he was in Bryan College Station, Ross was credited with saving the university and likely dined at the Cavitt House.

In the 1920s, the Cavitts decided to modernize the home's appearance. They added stucco to the exterior walls, took down much of the gingerbread trim, and tried to make the home appear more neoclassical, according to Haynes.

Eventually, the house was sold to another influential man with ties to Texas A&M, Peter McIntyre. "If you've ever heard of the Superconductor Super Collider ... he was the guy in charge of it," says Haynes.

Paul and Dorothy Van Ripper bought the property from the McIntyres and lived there from the 1980s to the early 2000s. They fixed structural problems, replaced electrical wiring, got new heating and cooling systems, and restored the home to the style in which the Cavitts had renovated it in the 1920s.

The Van Rippers have fascinating backgrounds of their own. "If nobody else but Paul Van Ripper lived there, it would still be a pretty cool place," Haynes says. Paul was a political science professor at Texas A&M, and Dorothy was a groundbreaking English teacher and literature professor. President George H.W. Bush and Barbara Bush dined at the Cavitt House twice with the Van Rippers.

Paul Van Ripper was the man in charge of renting French railroads from the French in World War II. "He was in charge of this Paris train station that all the railroads came into," Haynes explains. "For every train where we sent guns or bombs or

whatever out to people, we had to pay the French people. If we were going to be in some office or palace for something, we paid rent. He was the guy who kept track of all that. ... He literally dealt with Charles de Gaulle."

The Cavitt House is now owned by Leo Gonzalez. He fell in love with the home as a child riding his bike to the mansion and peeking inside.

Like the Van Rippers, Gonzalez purchased the home when it was in need of repair. The front left corner of the house had started to crumble. Gonzalez worked with a mason to fix the problem, although they ran into some issues at first.

The mason told Gonzalez to get some bricks so he could fix the corner. Gonzalez purchased a load of modern bricks from Lowe's only to find they were too small. "There's no way we can use these to fix this," Gonzalez explains. "I don't know what I'm going to do." Luckily, Dr. Van Ripper had brought bricks from Ursuline Convent (which was built with bricks similar to those used in the Cavitt House) to the Cavitt property when the convent was torn down. The bricks were still sitting on the Cavitt property when the corner crumbled. The convent bricks were the perfect size, and the brick mason was able to repair the corner, according to Gonzalez.

While Gonzalez and the brick mason were working on the corner of the Cavitt House, Haynes paid them a visit. "Randy [gave] me the most beautiful watercolor painting of the house," he says. Haynes had recovered the painting from the Cavitt House attic and said he would eventually give it to the home's new owner.

The Gonzalez family lived in the Cavitt House for two years. They only moved back to their previous residence, an eight-bedroom, seven-bathroom house, because it had not sold. For now, the Cavitt house is rented by a family that fills the home with six kids, two of whom are twins just like the Cavitts.

The Cavitt House has served as a home to many. Renovations since the Cavitts lived there have restored the home rather than modernize it. The importance of the Cavitt House to the Brazos Valley lies in the history that has passed through it.

"This is one of those things that make the community extremely different," Haynes says. "Never mind the fact that this is, if not the oldest, one of the oldest in town. ... It's not only significant because of its age, structure type, and style, but a combination of all those things. It is really, really important. It's what makes Bryan, Bryan." *i*

A House of Characters, Collectors, and Influential People

There are too many stories and artifacts from the Cavitt House to count, much less retell in a few short pages. Haynes and Gonzalez generously share some of their favorite stories and facts with **INSITE** below. More information about the Cavitts and the Cavitt House can be found at the Carnegie History Center in Downtown Bryan and at Cushing Library at Texas A&M.

- Unique items found on the Cavitt property include a tombstone that was stolen by Texas A&M fraternity boys (and eventually returned), a 36 caliber Civil War era Remington revolver, and a diary listing all the boys from Texas A&M who gave one of the Cavitt daughters a ride in their car.
- One of the Cavitt sisters owned two pet bears. One is buried in the backyard. The other was sold to a man in Dallas. When the second bear was in the freight office in Downtown Bryan, it got out of its crate around midnight. Miss Cavitt had to go to the train station in her nightgown to lead the bear back into its crate.
- Fred Cavitt, W.R. Cavitt's youngest son, was a photographer. Thanks to his work, we have pictures of historical landmarks like the Cavitt House. There is a darkroom for developing film in the Cavitt House attic.
- During the time the Cavitt family lived in the house, they had one of only two tennis courts in town. The local newspaper would post tournament dates, standings, and locations of matches. The Cavitt tennis court is long gone, but the Gonzalez' built a sand volleyball court in the backyard.
- Before roads existed in Bryan, the city had a master plan of where roads would go. However, many residents didn't realize the roads would cut through their property because the original landowners had died before roads were built. One instance included Haswell street, which cut through the Cavitt property and blocked the way for Miss Cavitt to get to the tennis courts. There was a big land dispute up to and including the moment when Miss Cavitt pulled a gun on a worker, telling them to, "Get the hell off of my land." The road was eventually put in despite Miss Cavitt's threat.
- The Cavitts built an elaborate garden in their backyard for garden parties resplendent with rugs, stone arches, and an assortment of ornamental plants.
- Four streets in Bryan are named after the Cavitt family: Cavitt Avenue, Twin Boulevard, Esther Street, and Ethel Street.
- The only death by cannon fire in Bryan was witnessed by Charlie Jenkins, a guest at the Cavitt House. A few blocks from the house, two cannons were brought to Bryan from Texas A&M to celebrate the election of Grover Cleveland. The celebration was cut short when a man loading the cannon blew off his arm.
- The Cavitt house was in the family almost exactly 100 years. When the last two Cavitt sisters died, the property was subdivided into three parts, the lot the Cavitt House sits on, a lot that is now home to a Victorian home moved here in 1984, and the land that is now Heritage Park.
- Five families have owned the Cavitt House. Three of the owners have been lawyers. The other two were professors with doctorate degrees.

UNLOCKING A TREASURE Benefits to Making a Keyhole Garden

Gardening over the years has evolved immensely due to the increase of technology and demand of resources. Ranging from agricultural fields to rooftop raised-bed gardens, gardens continue to change to ensure efficiency and quality products. One garden rising in popularity is the keyhole garden.

Bob Knight, a retired Texas A&M University professor for the health and physical department, now called the department of health & kinesiology, is reshaping gardening as we know it. Knight has always been interested in gardening, but discovered the keyhole garden idea from an article he read by Deb Tolman. He liked it so much he decided to bring the popular African gardening technique to the Brazos Valley. He started his own keyhole garden six years ago, and developed Bob's Home Grown Tomatoes four years ago.

A keyhole garden is an above-ground, three-foot brick or stone garden with a small inlet leading to the middle of the garden, hence the keyhole part of its name. This unique design allows the gardener to access every part of the garden without straining to bend over or reach across. The appeal of the keyhole garden is that anyone can do it, particularly senior citizens who can't bend over or squat down as easily, Knight says.

Knight started his own garden because he wanted to provide for his family. "You



can develop successful crops much more easily with [the keyhole garden] without being an expert, and that's what excited me or prompted me to continue in that," Knight explains.

After two years of successful gardening, Knight decided to venture out and start selling his produce, specifically his tomatoes. His tomatoes became a big hit and he is currently selling to restaurants in the Brazos Valley area.

One appealing factor of Knight's tomatoes is that they are organic. "Everybody is keying in on that [growing organically]. My stuff is organic but it's not because I'm thinking, 'This has to be organic.' It's just that I use natural materials," Knight says. Not only is the produce organic, but the fertilizer is as well. The earthworms that make their home inside the soil leave their waste, or "black gold" as Knight calls it, to work as a natural fertilizer for the garden.

Knight says with possible food commodities decreasing and vegetables becoming costly, starting a keyhole garden is resourceful and self-sufficient. "It is a unique way for a small family to grow enough food to nourish their family, and they can do that without spending a lot a money because when you salvage your materials, that doesn't cost you anything." *i*



Make Your Own Keyhole Garden

1. Gather Materials

Knight says to use recycled materials for your keyhole garden. He suggests getting your brick/stone from construction sites by talking to the builders ahead of time. Then collect newspapers, phone books, cardboard, leaves, and grass clippings, for these decompose easily and attract earthworms. Next, he says to gather other natural fertilizers to mix with the soil.

2. Build

When building your garden, start with a small circle with an inlet in it. Your circle should be six feet in circumference. Next, lay all your cardboard and other decomposable materials at the bottom. At the bottom of the inlet, place a basket that can be used as a compost deposit. Then fill the rest of the garden with your soil and fertilizer.

3. Grow

Use normal watering procedures for the type of plants you want, and maintain the garden from bugs, birds, and weeds. Follow these steps and you will have a successful keyhole garden in no time! Go from an Enclosed Living Space to a Fully Screened Porch in SECONDS!





Texas Reds was originally started by the City of Bryan as a part of their revitalization project, says Katelyn Brown, events coordinator for the Downtown Bryan Association. The DBA took over running the festival four years ago.

The festival kicks off on Friday with a concert by Wynonna & The Big Noise at 9:30 p.m. Saturday, guests have the chance to participate in a variety of activities, and on Sunday, Downtown Bryan shops open their doors for visitors to shop their hearts out. Also on Sunday is the Steak and Egg Brunch, complete with Texas wines and a mimosa bar from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Greg Tivis Nawlins Jazz Band performs Sunday during the brunch from 12 to 3 p.m. at the Palace Theater.

The main attraction on Saturday is, of course, the beer and wine tents. "You can enjoy Texas Reds in a variety of different ways," Brown says. "Whether you want to drink wine or drink beer, we have different tasting packages available for that." They offer packages just for wine, just for beer, for beer and wine, and for each featured steak meal. Brown says because of the growth of wine vendors and participants, the DBA added another wine tent this year so everyone has more "room to breathe."

The food packages include certain dinners and brunches. One meal is their famous Saturday night J. Cody steak dinner from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m., Brown says. On Sunday is the Steak and Egg Brunch, which will be held in the middle of Main Street — something the DBA has never done before, Brown says.

Texas Reds has also added a new dinner to the lineup this year. The DBA has partnered with Madden's Casual Gourmet to host an "unwind and dine" dinner, Brown explains. It will be a three-course steak dinner that walks you through the wine pairings.

The Steak Cook-Off on Saturday is another popular event at Texas Reds.

Free activities for festivalgoers include the grape stomp, hosted by the Bryan Noon Lion's Club, in front of the Carnegie History Center and the Kids Zone, which features inflatable bounce houses, the Purple Turtle Art Studio, and a miniature barrel train, according to the Texas Reds Festival website. Additionally, throughout the streets of Downtown Bryan will be local artists and vendors, as well as musicians playing on different stages planted throughout the festival, Brown says.

Ultimately, Texas Reds is designed to bring guests to Downtown Bryan, and that is exactly what the festival does. "I just love that the community has the opportunity to come to Downtown Bryan and experience it in a very different way, and to celebrate all things Texas," Brown says. "The Texas wine, the Texas beer, the live music, the arts ... it's just a big celebration."

CHANGE A LIFE Michelle Lynn Holsey Foundation Cutting Horse Competition

The Michelle Lynn Holsey Foundation is hosting their 12th annual Cutting Horse Competition Oct. 3 through 7 and a dinner, auction, and concert on Oct. 6 at the Brazos County Expo Complex.

Lee Holsey, president of the Michelle Lynn Holsey Foundation, started the foundation after losing his wife, Michelle, to cancer in 2006. Holsey says she had a giving spirit and always wanted to help others. Even while battling cancer herself, his wife was always trying to find ways to help the people they would meet who were struggling in the same ways she was. Her selfless heart and desire to give to others is what sparked the idea to begin the foundation.

"You sit around in waiting rooms for months and months and you get to know these people," says Holsey. "So, when she passed, I thought, 'Man this would be a really nice way to remember her, to help these people we met.""

In 12 years, the Michelle Lynn Holsey Foundation has given away more than \$1 million in grants and scholarships, according to Holsey. The funds aren't used to help find a cure for cancer. The foundation's main goal is to help people who are struggling with illnesses pay bills, buy medicine, and get to and from treatments. Many miss work when they (or a family member) are sick, and these funds help alleviate the financial burden.

were missing work because their child was sick, or their spouse was sick, and we'd hear the stories in the waiting rooms about their struggles. ... We help a lot of kids. I would say at least half of our recipients are young people battling cancer."

This year's operating cost is \$10,000 a month and last year's was \$12,000 a month. Fundraisers like the Cutting Horse Competition help with operating costs and those in need.

"This is our main fundraiser we do each year," says Holsey. "We raise money to help men, women, and children on their quest to battle cancer and other debilitating diseases and conditions while funding innovative research and education."

The Cutting Horse Competition is the biggest event held by The Michelle Lynn Holsey Foundation. This is a ranch-derived sport where competitors have two and a half minutes to drive through a herd of cattle and sort them, according to Holsey.

At dinner, there will be a silent auction that consists of anything from clothing and jewelry to gift baskets and gift certificates. The live auction is comprised of several different trip packages. Country singer Jason Cassidy is the concert headliner.

Holsey says he's expecting about 500 to 600 people to attend this year's event, but hopes for more. He encourages everyone to come out because this doesn't just affect a few people; it affects everyone.

"Everyone knows someone that cancer affects, so if we're blessed enough that we're not ill and fighting the disease, the least we can do is help others," says Holsey. "There aren't many people like us out there that help in monetary ways. That helps people who are struggling financially because of their illness. There are a lot of people out there looking for a cure or helping build some hospital, which are all very necessary, but I think our foundation is unique because we're helping people on a personal level."





SCARECROW FESTIVAL Fall Food, Fun, and Festivities

Driving through the streets of Chappell Hill in October may seem a bit scary — if you're a crow that is. The Chappell Hill Historical Society hosts their annual Scarecrow Festival on Oct. 13 and 14.

The Chappell Hill Historical Society is a nonprofit, volunteer organization dedicated to the preservation of historical buildings in Chappell Hill. The festival helps raise money for the Historical Society. It's also a chance to educate visitors about historical significances and occurrences in Chappell Hill, according to Joel Romo, president of The Chappell Hill Historical Society.

"The Scarecrow Festival was designed to attract people that are interested in antiques and collectibles," says Romo. "The community started displaying scarecrows and preparing for the fall and it became a major attraction where there were scarecrow contests, more people got engaged, they decorated their homes and businesses, and the festival grew out of that." There are usually hundreds of scarecrows displayed during the event by the community of Chappell Hill. The festival attracts anywhere from 15,000 to 20,000 people per year, according to Romo. Although a lot of guests are from the Brazos Valley, 90 percent of the guests come from out of town places like Houston, Austin, and the Hill Country area. "This is one of the largest festivals in the state of Texas, and we are blessed that many of our attendees are from throughout Texas, not just local," says Romo.

Dance groups, ballets, and different musicians perform throughout the day. Two stages will also be open during the event, featuring performers like singer Abigail Tayler.

There will be food booths and beverages, train rides, and a kid's corner for visitors. The Chappell Hill Historical Society Museum, which has a huge exhibit relating to the 100th anniversary of World War I, will also be open. "Everything will be within walking distance," says Romo. "People can enjoy a day at the festival and take in the live music, the cultural arts — which is in our museum — kids activities, and of course, food and beverages."

The scarecrows may be the main attraction, but this festival helps bring out the town's historical significance as well. A lot of Texas history occurred in Chappell Hill leading up to Texas Independence.

"We invite people to come to our festival and enjoy a day in the country with arts and crafts and activities," says Romo. "We have beautiful historic buildings that are open to the public during our festival: a museum, library, Providence Baptist Church. We have so much to offer in the Chappell Hill area."

The free festival is on Oct. 13 and 14, from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Sunday. Parking is \$5, and vendor applications are still open. For more information about The Scarecrow Festival, visit chappellhillhistoricalsociety.com. *i*




