

### The Dudley Home 8 Lori Lane, College Station

The Dudley Home is a blend Georgian and Cape Cod styles. Built in 1987, this is the first home of Mark, owner of Dudley Construction, and Deanie, assistant dean of finance and administration for the College of Agriculture & Life Sciences at Texas A&M.

The gross square footage of the home is approximately 10,000 sq.ft., including significant porches and breezeways. The conditioned spaces are approximately 5,000 sq.ft. The back porch blocks the morning sun and provides great shade and relief from the extreme heat in the afternoon and the front porch shields the western side of the house from the extreme heat in the summer. Additionally, the largely unconditioned carriage house blocks the north wind from the main house.

The Carriage House is the most unique structure. It has a superstructure of rigid frames and secondary framing members derived from the pre-engineered metal building industry. A tremendously energy efficient structure, the carriage house has a glass basketball backboard suspended from the steel superstructure. The floor is stained in the shape of a basketball key.

The Dudleys love entertaining, the outdoors and athletics and as such they built their home to accommodate those lifestyles. The back porch/pool area is ideal for entertaining, whether it's a few folks over for a swim to beat the heat, to watch a game at the outdoor bar and grille, a domino tournament, a family gathering or something as formal as a wedding, it is an easy area for large groups to comingle and enjoy one another.

Artwork by Mark's mom, June Dudley, hang throughout the house. Her artwork is in galleries throughout the southwest and she paints their favorite subjects: their children and their ranch.








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### Astin Mansion 506 W 26th Street, Bryan

The Astin Mansion was built in 1924 for Roger Astin and is on the National Register of Historic Homes. The Antebellum architecture was designed for entertaining and continues to serve that purpose, managed as a special events venue by Chelsi Coldiron, niece of Astin Mansion's owners who live in Houston. Astin Mansion can accommodate 400 guests, and is available to the public to rent for receptions or other social affairs.

The original carriage house and the children's playhouse remain behind the mansion. The children's playhouse is an exact replica of the home, which was a private residence for almost 80 years.

Entering the foyer, visitors are transported to the 1920s by the grand staircase, intricate ironwork and the original 1920's light fixtures. The Mansbendel Room, highlighted by a marble fireplace, is embellished with original moldings and carvings by noted Swiss-born Texas carver Peter Mansbendel. The Conservatory



is limestone, with its original marble floor and round Tudor Gothic fireplace; it opens to the colonnaded front portico.

Mrs. Astin's bedroom and sitting room, complete with marble fireplace, bathroom with original tiling and a knocker on her door, are upstairs. The Blue Room was Mr. Astin's bedroom; visitor's will note there is not a knocker on his door. The children enjoyed a large playroom that overlooks the front of the house. This room includes original hardwood floors and a working fireplace. The home is adorned with 27 paint colors, all from the 1920s, original sconces, fixtures and flooring.

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### Simmons-Smith House 614 East 32nd Street, Bryan

Built in 1935 in the area known today as the East Side Historic District, extensive renovation has been done by current owners Ulrike and Dr. Jonathan Smith. Dr. Smith is a professor of historical geography at Texas A&M and Mrs. Smith is a native of Austria.

The house is a Cape Cod cottage by architect Edgar W Glenn. Some bricks on the home have the signatures of children who attended the demolished Villa Maria Academy (1901-1929). The living room features a fireplace that has a Federal style surround without a mantle as was the style in the 1760's. Like all colonial revival houses from the 1920s and 1930s, the living room has simple but elegant wooden detailing.

The sunroom was originally an outside porch. Dr. Smith designed and built the porch swing. Dr. Smith was the designer and builder/ carpenter of many of the built-in's in the home. A highlight of this room is an antique railroad map depicting the route of the Texas Central Railroad, which ran through Bryan and ended in a place formerly known as "Nevesota."

The master bedroom with attached bathroom is an uncommon feature of the home for its time. The cast iron bathtub is original. The three Smith children enjoy a child's paradise outdoors where the Smiths have created steps on a tree trunk lead up to a roosting spot for reading; a sand box fort and a fish pond. i April 14 from 9 a.m. until 11:30 a.m., Keep Brazos Beautiful, in partnership with Don't Mess With Texas, TXDOT and Keep Texas Beautiful, will host the 12th Annual Area Texas Trash Off.

# Larry Hodges, age

It was Martin Luther King Jr. Day. Not unusually, Larry was at his desk at Copy Corner early. Dressed in sweats, his plan was to finish at his office for the morning and head to the gym for a workout before showering and getting dressed for an evening engagement.

> Gym time figured large in Larry's routine. About five years before he'd had one of those age-related reappraisals and come to the conclusion that the years between 30 and 40 had been too fast: too fast food; too fast and furious entrepreneurial lifestyle; too fast on his way to being heavier than he'd ever been in his life.

> So he changed gears, started working out and eating better and dropped the excess weight.

Thinking back on that morning Larry says he felt great, even better than when he was 15 years younger.

### Life was good.

"I was about ready to go work out. Then I felt lightheaded," Larry recalls, "but I'd had that before." He wasn't really worried, thinking maybe it was leftover from a winter cold. "I didn't feel bad really," he explains, "just odd."

Then his left foot went numb.

Thirteen months later as Larry recounts the moment when the numbness shot from his left foot all the way up his leg, the left side of his body and his face, it is with a touch of incredulity.

"But I knew," he adds, answering the question as much to himself as anyone.

### LIFE LESSONS

The story of Larry's business startup is a bit of its own incredible tale. He launched Copy Corner his senior year at Texas A&M University, too impatient on his way to success to finish his finance degree before renting the mothballed post office on the corner of Texas Avenue and Jersey Street (now George Bush Drive) and opening a copy shop. Copy Corner opened in November 1988; Larry graduated in August 1989, and he never looked back. The business moved into a huge custom space on Texas Avenue in 2004 expanding Copy Corner's desktop publishing and on-demand printing capabilities.

Copy Corner defined Larry's professional life; it would also save his life.

"Years ago I was at the front counter and a guy came in wanting copies of 'Signs of Stroke," says Larry, who read the sheet as he made the 20 copies the customer planned to send to friends.

The sudden left-side numbness and feeling lightheaded on that MLK Monday fit the stroke signs he recalled reading years ago. "But you wonder. I got up and looked in the mirror; my smile wasn't crooked. I had decent muscle control. But it wasn't right. It was too weird," he says.

Instead of calling 911 as the "Signs of Stroke" sheet recommended, Larry called downstairs to Vicki, his office manager and trusted friend of the past 18 years.

"I asked her to bring her truck to the door. I didn't want to sound the alarm at the shop," says Larry by way of explanation. "I could walk. I took the elevator downstairs."

Larry called his personal physician, internal medicine doctor Philip Alexander, as Vicki drove him to the emergency room at the College Station Medical Center. He also called his neighbor, Dr. Ricardo Guiterrez, a cardiologist with Central Texas Heart Center.

Dr. Alexander was waiting for Larry at the ER, and Larry remembers the ensuing events clearly: being taken back immediately; the nurses starting an IV; having a seizure. What eludes him is any concept of time over the next 48 hours. "Zero," he says, holding up a circled thumb and forefinger.

### THE MEDICAL MAW

A CT scan of his head would show nothing amiss, but an MRI later that evening confirmed that Larry had suffered an ischemic stroke, the type of stroke caused by a blockage in an artery to the brain. The MRI results also indicated that Larry had likely had another stroke sometime in the past.

From those and other test results, Dr. Guiterrez wanted to check Larry's heart for the presence of a Patent Foramen Ovale or PFO, a tiny hole in the wall that separates the two upper chambers of the heart. In the womb, the foramen ovale allows oxygen-rich blood from the mother to circulate from the umbilical cord



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to the fetus. This hole naturally closes at birth. Except when it doesn't, which happens in about 25 percent of the population and creates a PFO.

Larry fit the profile of a PFO patient: someone who has a cryptogenic stroke - a stroke of unknown cause particularly if they are younger than age 55 when they have a stroke. Forty percent of patients who present with these symptoms have a PFO.

Larry was awake during the diagnostic procedure and recalls watching the screen as Dr. Guiterrez tried to confirm a PFO with a scope inserted into his heart. They didn't see a hole, but they did see bubbles leak through the upper chambers after air was injected. Bubbles didn't guarantee a PFO, but made it "statistically likely," says Larry. Those same statistics pointed to Larry's higher risk for future strokes.

### **A SECOND OPTION**

Treatment for PFO isn't cut and dried. The medical literature says that if a PFO is diagnosed through some routine test and the patient doesn't have any other symptoms or hasn't had a stroke, they don't need treatment.

When a patient like Larry has both a PFO and a confirmed stroke the treatment is usually blood-thinning medication such as aspirin, Plavix or Coumadin to prevent another stroke.

From the outside, being put on Coumadin and sent home to resume your "normal" life only 48 hours after a stroke sounds pretty good. To look at Larry, you wouldn't know anything had ever happened.

Larry knew. He was easily fatigued. He had to plan out once normal activities or risk feeling

exhausted and befuddled. Coumadin requires regular blood tests for monitoring levels. It gave him nosebleeds, but because of the stroke, Larry would be on it, or another blood thinner, for the rest of his life.

It was Dr. Guiterrez who told Larry about a second option: a tiny wire mesh disc that could be inserted into the hole to close it. While a "percutaneous closure device" is routinely used for some cardiac abnormalities, the devices aren't yet FDA approved for PFO repair. Larry had to have two doctors recommend him as a candidate for the procedure. He studied the literature online and then decided to talk to the surgeons at St. Luke's Methodist Hospital in Houston who were routinely repairing PFOs with this type of device.

"They told me I could die," he says. But to Larry, the better odds were on fixing the PFO and being spared 30 years on blood thinners and possibly another stroke. He scheduled the procedure.

### LOOKING OVER THE EDGE

Lying in pre-op waiting to have what looks like a tiny mesh umbrella inserted into the hole in his heart,

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Larry says he was in a good place emotionally. The first dose of the reality of his situation had been the look on his parents' faces when they walked into his hospital room on the afternoon he suffered the stroke. "It was sobering," says Larry. "For the first time in 45 years I couldn't tell them, 'I'll be OK."

### **EVER AFTER ... HAPPILY**

Awaiting the procedure to fix the hole, Larry says, "I was good. I was OK with whatever God's plan was for me." He admits it was harder on the trust factor to believe in God's plan for his then 12-year-old son and 15-year-old daughter to be OK if Larry wasn't around. Then the happy drugs kicked in.

Larry describes St. Luke's "factory-like" approach to cardiac procedures as oddly comforting - it's just all in a long, very busy day's work. Also on the OR schedule that day was an 18-year-old high school football player, a Division I college prospect who had elected the PFO repair procedure in the hope of returning to the gridiron. Before hearing the teenager's story, Larry admits to some "Why me?" moments.



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Months after his procedure to close the PFO, Larry is ... well ... Larry. Easy to talk to, quick to laugh, ready to share his experience in the hope of teaching someone how to recognize when they're having a stroke but also apprehensive about how his story will be received.

Physically, he's still as numb on his left side as he was seconds after the stroke. He's strong. When he closes his numb left hand around a weight during his workouts he's as strong as he ever was. He's less sanguine about his coordination. Gesturing to the full cup of coffee on the table, he remarks he wouldn't pick it up left-handed for fear he might spill it. The fatigue is better than in the first months after the stroke, but he still plans his activities for a milder pace than he would have five years ago. Larry describes his expectation that everything would return to "normal" after the procedure as his "mental mistake."

### **DO OVERS**

There are upsides. "It made me a better dad," he says immediately, mostly by not taking for granted that there will always be time to spend one-on-one with his kids. These days he comes down in favor of more family time over than more business time. He's into flax seed for Omega 3s and heart health and exercise for life.

If you ask Dr. Alexander what cautionary tale Larry Hodges' stroke at age 45 offers, it isn't that you ought to run to your doctor to check for a congenital heart defect like a PFO. Larry's case is unique for both its rarity in the general population and in that he has made such a remarkable recovery.

### FEAR THE RIGHT THING

Dr. Alexander enumerates the reasons behind that remarkable recover: 1. Larry was in excellent shape when he had the stroke; 2. Larry has worked very hard doing rehab to regain his physical strength and coordination; and 3. Larry was lucky: his stroke was in a "good location" in the back of the brain.

Two out of three of those factors – the environmental factors of diet and exercise – were in Larry's control. For the rest of us, that's where both the fear factor and comfort come into play for every health risk from stroke, heart attack and most cancers to osteoporosis,



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"You can't super focus on one [disease], because they all go together," says Dr. Alexander. Lifestyle – what you eat and how you exercise – affect every one of those disease categories, primarily through chronic cell inflammation and the buildup of plaques, both inside arteries in the heart and in the brain.

The solution, says Dr. Alexander, is to educate yourself about the role of Omega 3s and Omega 6s in the diet and to choose foods that will maintain a healthy balance.


That, notes Dr. Alexander, is something the typical American diet – overloaded with processed grains, meat, dairy and vegetable oils – fails at spectacularly. So out of balance is both our diet and our food chain with inflammationproducing foods it explains the explosion of all the disease categories we fear. That, suggests Dr. Alexander, is what reasonable people ought to worry about: lifestyle can balance disease risk.

### **COPY THIS MESSAGE**

For Larry, now 46, balance is the take-home message, too: work and play; diet and exercise; optimism without taking things for granted.



One thing Larry will never take for granted is the love and support from his family, friends and Copy Corner Crew who saw him through. He might add: sharing with family and friends the "Signs of Stroke," because the life they save could be yours. *i*

### **TOP 5 SYMPTOMS OF A STROKE**

- 4. Sudden trouble walking, dizziness, loss of balance or coordination

### What is a stroke?

A stroke is what happens when blood flow to the brain is interrupted. Brain cells in the immediate area begin to die because of a lack of oxygen. The two most common types of strokes are ischemic stroke and hemorrhagic stroke.

The more common ischemic stroke is caused by blockage in a blood vessel leading to the brain, either fatty deposits from the walls of arteries or blood clots that travel to the brain.

A hemorrhagic stroke is when a blood vessel in the brain bursts destroying the brain tissue around it. Hemorrhagic stokes are more common in patients with high blood pressure or an aneurysm, a weakness in the wall of a blood vessel.

### With Stroke, Time Kills

Unlike on the highway where speed kills, with a stroke, speed is the key to life and recovery. The greatest damage from a stroke often occurs within the first few hours. The faster correct treatment is given the greater chance the damage can be prevented or reversed.

Dr. Bradley White is co-medical director of St. Joseph's Stroke Program and the only neuro-interventionalist in the area. St. Joseph is the only Primary Stroke Center in the region, as designated by the Joint Commission for the Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations. In 2011, St. Joseph received the American Stroke Association's (ASA) Get With The Guidelines®-Stroke Gold Plus Quality Achievement Award in recognition of implementing excellent care for stoke patients according to evidence-based guidelines.

Dr. White explains that the gold standard for stroke treatment includes two options: "clot-busting" medication such as tPA, and Mechanical Thrombectomy, the mechanical

removal of a stroke-causing clot.

When tPA (tissue Plasminogen Activator) is delivered into a blood vessel, the goal is to dissolve the clot and halt the stroke by restoring blood flow to the brain. This and other drug treatments must be given at the hospital within three hours of the onset of stroke symptoms.

With Mechanical Thrombectomy, patients are taken to the cath lab at St. Joseph where Dr. White can perform the Merci device procedure physically going inside the brain to mechanically remove the clot and restore blood flow. While these treatments can be miraculous in reducing the effects of a stroke, it takes recognizing the symptoms of a stroke, calling 9-1-1, and getting to the hospital immediately to make these effective treatments possible.

### Know Your Stroke Risk Factors

While anyone can have a stroke there are risk factors that increase the chance it will happen to you. According to Dr. White, "The top risk factors for stroke include smoking, high blood pressure, diabetes and an abnormal heart rhythm." Rather than worry, Dr. White offers this as a stroke prevention goal: 80% of strokes are preventable if the associated risk factors are reduced.

Maintaining a healthy lifestyle will almost completely eliminate your chance of having a stroke. Registered Nurse Amy Plotts is coordinator of the Stroke/Chest Pain Services for St. Joseph and says the answer to lowering your risk of stroke is to get healthy: "Stop smoking; see a doctor about your blood pressure and cholesterol; be sure to follow your medication correctly; and get active!" i

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# Child Abuse Prevention Month

Child abuse is a scourge in any community. During Child Abuse Prevention month in April, a coalition of agencies will be drawing attention to the sad facts: last year, 688 Brazos Valley children were confirmed victims of abuse or neglect; 117 children were removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect; and two children died as a result of abuse or neglect, according to the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services 2011 Databook. From a broader perspective, every eight minutes a Texas child becomes an abuse victim and one child will die every 36 hours because of abuse or neglect. Kate Mason, who

serves as recruitment and education coordinator for Voices For Children – Court Appointed Special Advocates of Brazos Valley, along with other local agencies, has developed a child abuse awareness alliance in the hope of increasing awareness and leading our community to a safer and healthier place for children.

The Child Abuse Awareness Alliance Brazos Valley (CAAABV) is comprised of more than a dozen local nonprofit and victim services agencies. These agencies include representatives from the Sexual Assault Resource Center, Brazos County Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Brazos County Health Department, Crime Victim Conference Alliance, Voices for Children, Scotty's House, Brazos County Child Welfare Board, Prenatal Clinic, Child Care Licensing, Texas Department of Family and Protective Services-Foster Care/ Adopt Program, and Kappa Delta, and Texas Department of Family and Protective Services-Child Protective Services, and Texas A&M University Police Department.

"We have planned a month filled with opportunities for community members to become more informed about the ways to protect and support our children and strengthen our families," says Mason. ### WanderID to Hold Registration at Earth Day

When young children or people with cognitive difficulties such as Alzheimer's, dementia, brain injury or Down syndrome wander off into unfamiliar surroundings they often are not able to identify themselves putting themselves in dangerous situations. Imagine someone you know with cognitive difficulties trying to explain to a stranger who they are or where they live.

With the WanderID, families can take comfort in knowing that if a loved one were to wander, this new technology would lead them one step closer to getting the missing person quickly home. During the Earth Day celebration at Wolf Pen Creek on April 21, WanderID will have a booth to register those interested in the service. A photographer will be on location to take photos needed to register someone.

Mary Haskett, co-founder of WanderID, says an epiphany after reading articles about the growing epidemic of wandering adults and the coming silver tsunami of the baby boomer generation lead to the creation of the service. With a M.Ed. in Educational Technology, Haskett partnered with fellow Texas A&M graduate Dr. Alex Kilpatrick who has a Ph.D. in Computer Engineering to launch WanderID after two years of development. Their vision was to use biometric technology to create a database that will allow a broad audience cheap, easy access to a safe system that yields quick results if a loved one goes missing. environment by fusing world-class singing, industrial style drumming, award winning break-dancing and comedy antics into a unique and uplifting experience."

"Our ultimate goal is to provide 'In Case of Emergency' contact information for everyone in need," says Haskett.

A simple "passport style" photo, online registration to complete a profile, and uploading emergency contact information are all that is required to create a WanderID account. If a loved one does wander, a police officer, EMS, or concerned citizen can snap a photo of the missing person and send it using the free smart-phone app or via email to WanderID where the state-of-the-art facial recognition technology promptly finds a match of the photographs. Once a match is found, the emergency contact info will be available and a call can be placed to the missing person's caregiver. Bryan/ College Station and Texas A&M police departments have been trained to use WanderID, and about 50 locals have registered so far.

WanderID charges a membership fee of \$9.95 per month, \$99.95 per year or \$250 for a lifetime membership. WanderID is currently offering six months of free enrollment with a coupon code 6FREE when setting up a WanderID account.



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enise Fries has a history of giving back to this community in a big way.
