Texas Historic 609 S. Ennis Bryan Historic District



The 5,000-square-foot, two-and-one-half-story home of Julian and Dr. Mary Alfred in the

Historic District of Bryan epitomizes the understated elegance of an early 20th

century home. Listed on the National Registry and identified with a Texas Historic marker, the Alfreds purchased the brick home several years ago when they relocated here from Florida. Julian is retired from the military and Mary is an Associate Dean in the College of Education at Texas A&M University.

Charlie Jenkins constructed the neoclassic and Georgian Revival style home in 1925 for just under \$24,000 for local merchant Eugene Edge. The house proudly contained the first "ice box" and air conditioner in town. The previous owners, the Hilers, were dedicated to preserving the integrity of the home,

and replaced the original pier and beam construction with concrete beams.

The front entrance is graced with rose beds that frame the historic marker. The arched brick-patterned doorway echoes the curved lines throughout the house and continues in the reception area where the oak floors are trimmed in mahogany with corners featuring the Greek key design. All walls and ceilings are plaster with ornate moldings. The doors all have the original glass knobs.

The stately dining room features handblown beveled glass pocket doors in the archway, adding their sparkle and glimmer to the crystal chandelier and the leaded glass and beveled-edged transom windows.

The original, but still functioning, kitchen is adjoined by a large butler's pantry, wet bar and a family breakfast room where the sun offers a warm embrace to the room.

The connecting hallway showcases the framed original house plans dating back to March 20, 1924. The living room and other downstairs rooms as well as upstairs quarters are replete with a collection of original paintings by artist Charles Bibbs from Riverside, California, and are reminiscent of the family's homeland of St. Lucia in the


Caribbean. Juxtaposing the ethnic art against the formal Victorian-style furniture makes each room a standout.

In contrast, the cozy and casual appeal of the second floor includes the master bedroom and additional guest quarters. The landing area, now a family room, was the bridge room where Mrs. Edge entertained her lady friends at regular parties. A nearby pullout cabinet housed her bridge tables. Three sleeping porches, built originally to catch full breezes in the South, have been turned into studies/media areas for the owners and connect to the other bedrooms.

This is a house with a pedigree that must be seen to be appreciated.

The comfortable and spacious home of Dr. and Mrs. Tom Salzer is in the River Run Estates of College Station. The

sprawling 6,000-square-foot limestone estate was designed by Antonio Flamenco of Insite Architecture in Houston and built by Keith Ellis of Ellis Homes in 1997. An addition was made to the home in 2005. Tom and Martha Salzer have lived in the community, where Dr. Salzer is a practicing physician, for more than 14 years.

An extraordinary mix of Guatemalan and primitive antiques give the house a sense of warmth and purpose. Dr. Salzer has traveled to Guatemala on medical missions for more than 10 years and Guatemala happens to be the native home of the designer. In fact, Tom and Antonio conceived the design for the addition to the home on one of their mission trips together. Guatemalan tapestries, wood carvings (retablos), masks, carved doors for the media room, iron chandeliers, wall sconces and wooden statues give a noticeable

distinction of antique Spanish flavor to this home.

The inspiration for the house was a natural limestone ravine that runs the length of the property. One hundred fifty-year-old heart of pine from old factories in New England is used throughout the house. Pecan wood in the game room and media room, mesquite wood in the study and wine cellar,

cedar in the outdoor kitchen and casita, and long leaf pine in the rest of the house all imbue the home with warmth and hospitality. Countertops are granite and Brazilian slate and several rooms in the main house and casita feature embossed tin paneled ceilings.

Dr. Salzer grew up in an old colonial house in New England and has always collected primitive antiques, so he wanted to incorporate that antique feeling in their new home as well. The home features pre-Columbian collected by Tom and his father; mid-1800's household and garden/ farm implements; an old pay toilet door in the study from Mystic, CT; an antique glass

door to the wine cellar; an English Victorian fireplace surround in the master bedroom, and many other antique accessories, collections, and furnishings in the house. Finding new uses for old objects is part of the allure of this hill country home.

Alan King of The Land Design Group originally landscaped the home with xeriscaping. The addition features a negative

edge pool with stone walls and waterfalls, stained concrete and flagstone walkways, a boulder bridge, a blocked-glass lighted bridge with stone icons, and a bronze statue all created by Larry Schueckler. Also included in the addition are a billiard room with walkin wine cellar, a media room and a two-story casita, exercise room, and outdoor kitchen.

This house provides a feast for the eyes and inspires a wealth of ideas.

Tucked into the woods and lake area of Miramont Estates in Bryan, the home owned by Dr. Pat Guseman and Clay

Gerngross has an open-floor plan of 5,000-square-feet and is described by the owners as a restful, quiet and minimalist style.

Pat, a College Station demographer, owns Population and Survey Analysts, and Clay is the owner of GLP Technologies. The fourmonth-old home reflects their recent marriage and the blending of their two styles.

The two-story house was designed and built by Cornerstone Architects of Austin on a little less than an acre of land and includes a green space and lake in the back yard. Local builders Rick and Selina Colwell built the home and Bob Ruth, a local landscape architect, designed the outdoor spaces. Mary Evelyn White and Susan Tremont of By Design Interiors and Gail Moore of Gail Moore Interiors designed the interior of the home.

The two-story entry features a massive hand-carved chandelier suspended from the beamed ceiling. Towering above is a bridge of bookcases and collectibles connecting the two upper wings containing a study alcove, media room, and guest quarters.

The entire home could be described as a historical romance. The foyer leading to the master suite showcases an antique model of a German castle enclosed in a custom-made glass armoire designed by the owner. The model was created by German prisoners for Pat Guseman's father, who was the director of German prison camps in East Texas during World War II. The prisoners even left buttons from their uniforms and models of tiny soldiers buried in the basement of their model.

The upper level offers an unexpected surprise at the top of the stairs. Balanced on the landing is a rotating museum of hidden treasures from the combined Guseman/Gerngross family estates that changes monthly.

The downstairs has an open concept

kitchen that features blonde granite. Multidimensional subway tiles for the backsplash are glazed to give a mid-century look. The dining table was rescued from the Bryan Carnegie Library years ago at an auction and restored to its present old-world patina.


The living area features an array of handcarved antique furniture from the Black Forest region of Germany, hand-knotted naturaldyed Egyptian rugs from a small village close to Cairo, and art wall tiles from a saloon in Bryan, one punctuated with a bullet hole. The floors are pecan planks.

The first floor features not only a ladies' powder room, but also a men's powder room complete with hand-painted and textured reptile wall coverings. The room also includes "Michelangelo" style marble, a copper porcelain sink and copper fixtures.



BUY NOW

"I have been telling people for the last 12 months that if they are comfortable and

secure with their jobs, then it is a great time to buy," says Mark Dotzour, chief economist at The Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University. Most mortgage rates are currently at 5% or below, which he describes as "a gift from the government."

"The stability in our market is due to Texas A&M and our strong medical community," says Cherry Ruffino, realtor and vice president of sales of Coldwell Banker United. Ruffino echoes that interest rates are the lowest in a decade, but she foresees an increase of 1% to 1.5% in the next 60 days, making the incentive to buy now even greater.

"It is a once in a lifetime opportunity," says Dotzour about buying a home in B/CS right now. Dotzour also says prices in B/CS are likely to remain stable and there is little risk they will decline. Ruffino concurs saying that our annual appreciation rate has averaged 5% to 8% over the years; in 2009, home prices appreciated just at 3%. "This is fabulous compared to the rest of the country," says Ruffino, considering other areas in the country are seeing anywhere from 10% to 30% decrease in-home values.

Even in our stable market, the overall

number of homebuyers has dropped. "We had 17% fewer buyers because of the concern with the economy," says Ruffino, mostly a drop in "move-up" buyers. "Move-up buyers made conservative decisions not to make a move for a larger, nicer home," says Ruffino. "What has affected our economy in B/CS as well as nationwide are lending requirements," she says.


Besides lenders now requiring a stellar credit score, according to Ruffino "in the next 60 days we will see another tightening "This allowance really helps folks because so many times buyers have good credit, but need assistance with cash purchases.

"A buyer with good credit, low debt, and a secure job can obtain a loan and a very good rate," says Ruffino. The tax credit extension, which is intended to bring and keep more buyers in the housing market, includes incentives for first-time homebuyers as well as for homeowners who have lived in their home five of the last eight years. "The amount

of loans, specifically FHA loans" aimed at first-time buyers. These loans require less money down and offer lower qualifying rates. "Currently, a buyer has to have a 3.5% down payment on their home; it is expected to go to a 5% down payment," says Ruffino. Another benefit of FHA loans is that sellers can pay buyers' closing costs, explains Ruffino.

of the credit is \$6,500. The deadline for both tax credits is to have a home under contract by April 30, 2010, and closed by June 30, 2010. There is still time," says Ruffino. "We will adjust to all these changes. Historically the purchase of real estate has been a safe investment and it continues to be so today, especially here at home in B/CS."

In addition to low interest rates, there are incentives for those who want to build a home, too,


particularly an energy-efficient home. David Gwin, director of economic and community development for the City of College Station, says the city is currently building four new homes with all "green" materials including high efficiency hot water heaters and recycled materials. "All of these green methods will benefit the community," says Gwin. Federal, state and local governments all provide different energy incentives for homebuilders including federal tax incentives for those seeking higher energy efficiency and city housing programs that are income qualified. Gwin invites anyone interested to make an appointment to talk about potential

incentives tailored to individual needs.

He also encourages people looking to replace major mechanical systems in their homes to invest now in energy friendly systems. Despite the upfront expense, Gwin explains there are huge benefits down the road. "The city is trying to find ways to help people overcome the initial high costs of these systems because they will be very beneficial in the long run for the community," says Gwin.

The city also offers a Buyer's Assistant Program to provide long-term deferred loans to potential income-qualified buyers. "There are a few limitations on the home, but most homes in College Station are potentially eligible," says Gwin.

MARKET VALUE

The local housing market is seasonal, says Marty Cangelose, owner and supervisory appraiser of M.G. Cangelose & Associates appraisers. Buyers look from March to

August and it slows down from September to February. Cangelose says we are experiencing good stable growth in B/CS: "There is about 3% appreciation (in home values) and it has been like this for about 15 to 17 years," says Cangelose. The segment of the market that's been affected more are houses priced over \$400,000 especially those from \$500,000 to \$1,000,000 or more. This price range has seemed to flatten out. Homes under \$400,000 are still experiencing growth, and Cangelose does not foresee much changing in 2010.

"People can still get financing because A&M provides a lot of jobs and we still have many businesses that are doing well," says Steve Harper, president and CEO of Brazos Valley Bank.

"Texas has been a bit more protected," says Melanie Motley, vice president of Mortgage Lending at The Bank and Trust. Motley says there are more people employed in Texas with good credit and savings, giving them better financing options. "With the high unemployment rate in the rest of the country, many people have been forced to live off savings and credit, which



makes it difficult to obtain financing," says Motley. Harper agrees that the economy in Texas is still solid, adding, "Bryan/College Station is probably one of the most reliable places to live."

COMMERCIAL REAL ESTATE

Residential real estate is enjoying substantially higher volume than commercial real estate, due primarily to a lack of liquidity. It is "almost impossible to borrow money on commercial real estate," says Casey Oldhan, chairman

and CEO of Oldhan Goodwin Real Estate. "These transactions take a significant amount of time to complete," he notes.


However, compared to the rest of the country, our local commercial real estate is doing quite well.

"We had good quality assets in 2000 prior to the economic meltdown, and we are still doing good today," says Oldhan. The late 2000's credit crashes were predicated by noise from the housing market, Oldhan explains; the poor housing market was responsible in part for the recent credit crash. While we are doing better than the rest of the nation, locally we have not increased our commercial market value, he says.

While Oldhan says the low number of commercial transactions makes it too early to make predictions for the future, the perception is that the commercial market is doing better than last year. *i*

open communication are the norm." Fleming says what separates K2Share from other companies is that they are about more than just making a deadline; they live in a realm of solutions, not a realm of problems.

"After the results came out, some of our employees told us they already knew we were one of the best places to work," says Kevin "Being one of the best companies to work for in Texas translates favorably to University Title's business and bottom line," says Dawn Bowers, customer advocate at University Title Company. University Title Company is the Brazos County's largest title insurance provider and has been around since 1973. "It is cost efficient because University Title Company does not have the expense of constantly replacing and training employees," says Bowers. In 2008, University Title Company closed more than 59% of the real estate business in the Brazos County, which Bowers says, "is a fantastic market share."
